May) the second Biggin Hill Air Fair included some fine spells of aerobatics, intermingled with rumblings from airliners as they ferried visitors around-one of the main objects of the show being to encourage air travel.

First thing to catch the eye was an incredible display by Peter Phillips in the Tiger Club's Cosmic Wind "Ballerina", G-ARUL: quick-fire rolls, bursts of inverted flying (which made the engine splutter), all in such a small compass. Nevil Browning, in Z.326 Trener Master G-ASIM, also seemed to like hanging upsidedown; and not to be outdone Ranald Porteous was rolling happily in Beagle 206Y G-ARXM.
